

But a limited evidence base on which to make policies that...

- Drive investment in supply of clean energy
- Speed up innovation in development of technology
- Increase uptake of energy efficiency products and public acceptance of new energy supplies
- Change consumer attitudes and behaviours towards energy efficiency
- Help to secure and speed up planning permissions for new plant
- Help with managing complex evolving markets
- Help to secure the transformational change in emerging / developing economies required for international progress

And so a clear rationale for evaluation designs that help fill gaps in the evidence base, in the context of live policies in action...

Making evaluations happen

Context - Strong drivers from across government and internally.

Strategy for driving evaluation in DECC:

- Evaluation planning embedded in business case approval
- Evaluation Board – 13 priority evaluations but responsibility is at programme level (SROs accountable)
- Central Evaluation Team activities
- DECC Evaluation Framework contract

Making evaluations good

- Evaluation activities undertaken before, during and after
- Integrating evaluation planning into policy design and development (where possible)
- Large scale complicated and complex evaluations to match our policies
- Supporting evaluation practice e.g. through Evaluation Practitioners Group, training
- Supporting evaluation design e.g. DECC Evaluation Framework Contract
- Tackling deficits on the evaluation supply side
- Methodological and practice innovation e.g. possible ESRC Centre for Evaluation of Complexity



Making evaluations count

- Findings delivered in time for key decisions and processes
- Further develop our ability to extract thematic learning from evaluations and research, and integration of external research
- Develop tools and strategies to support evaluation use in design of policies, policy appraisal process and wider decision making e.g. Comprehensive Spending Review



Conclusions

- Fair wind for Evaluation in Government
- Much greater role for evaluation that helps and informs policy – given limited evidence base, especially for policies with large scale transformative ambitions
- We need to grow expertise and practice in government and supply base for delivering large scale complicated and complex evaluations
